Pastor's Thoughts... Read Ephesians 5:8-14 and St. John 9:1-41

In this season of penance and discipline let us consider the question, "Which is the greater affliction, physical or spiritual blindness?" We might begin by honestly deciding which malady most directly afflicts our daily lives. To assist this quest, consider which condition we are most likely able to correct. Ask also, whether physical or spiritual health is a higher priority.

The lessons reacquaint us with scriptures focusing on light coming into the world. Paul's text has as its primary concern our spiritual vision. The gospel text begins with a story of Jesus' physical healing of one born blind. But then this account quickly moves onto helping us understand clear examples of what the Apostle Paul admonished the Ephesians.

First, we are introduced to the disciples' narrowness of vision as they ask of the man's affliction, "Who sinned, this man or his parents, that he was born blind?" (John 9:2). Their reaction is the blindness of accepting traditional opinions and theology, which ignores the teaching of the prophets. Do we ever embrace thoughts and opinions of persons based on conventional wisdom, which is just another term for prejudice?

We next see the blindness of legalism represented by the concern that this man had been healed on the Sabbath. Is there ever a proper time to not do the right thing? Again, is the Sabbath not made for human and not humans for the Sabbath? And, while it is all too easy to turn this freedom into licentious activity, we must never forget that Jesus came to free us from the chains of temporal concerns and politics for the righteousness. Thus, the concern for the Sabbath, and any legalism, can in truth be a stumbling block to faith, leaving the practitioner only more hungry and thirsty for the sake of righteousness than before.

The third avenue of blindness is the chosen doubt and disbelief of those who witnessed the end of the miracle. Honest doubt is one thing; it can inspire us to search more deeply for knowledge. But, in this case, the evidence is clear and yet rejected. Think of times and persons who have had all the proper information and continued on in a biased course of action because doing so conformed to their chosen and comfortable beliefs.

The final limiting condition is that of fear. The man's parents were afraid of what the Pharisees might do to them. What are some of the ways fear impedes our growth of faith and willingness to walk in the steps Jesus sets before us? Loss of status, others opinions of us, creature comforts and going along in order to get along, are these not but a few of the reasons we, at times, choose darkness over light?

The light has come into the world and we are empowered, as well as, called to walk in the light. Following his release from Spandau Prison, Albert Speer was asked of his Nazi War Crimes sentence, 'Dr. Speer, how could such intelligent, sophisticated and accomplished men, such as you, have come to take so active a role in such horrible crimes?' His answer was simple, "You must remember, the descent into hell is an exhilarating ride, but it is a one way trip. I know, for I am still there."

So which condition is a greater affliction for us? Consider the prayer of Alcoholics Anonymous:

"God grant me the serenity to accept the things I cannot change.
The courage to change the things I can.
And the wisdom to know the difference."

Dear Prayer Partners,

Greetings in the precious name of our Lord Jesus Christ from Nairobi. I trust this communication finds you being sheltered by God's amazing grace. Agnes and I continually praise God for being our shield and shelter in the midst of life's challenges. We too praise him for your partnership with us in his ministry as we serve him here in Kenya. Thank you so much for your prayer support, and for those who support us financially we deeply express our appreciation. To you all, we pray that God's amazing grace will be your portion as you worship him, and serve him in the capacity he has chosen for you.

We are grateful to God for the privilege of serving him through training of leaders at the university, and also reaching out to our community in the village. On Saturday March 2nd I had a great time with a dozen men at our home in the village. We started studying the book of Colossians, which I hope to teach for the next two to three months. After the meeting, and following taking breakfast I gave them some foodstuff to take home. I also gave each one a pair of pens. I praise God for the way these men expressed their gratitude to God for the gifts! Yesterday, I was privileged to be graduation speaker at a Bible college where one of my former student is the Principal. It was a great moment for me to see a good number of my former students, going as far back as two to three decades! Pray for these men and women that God will bless their ministries, and also meet their every need. Pray also for Agnes as she prepares for her ministry with over a hundred women on Friday March 29th. These women represent very needy families, and because of that we have been saving small amounts of money in order to purchase corn flour for each of them.

It is indeed, a privilege to serve the living God, and advance his kingdom globally. I really thank God for the privilege of teaching at International Leadership University. I am particularly excited about the quality of students we have, who are on fire for the Lord. Last weekend, over 10 students and two staff members traveled to our neighboring country of Uganda for a four days mission, when they came back, they were filled with gratitude for what God did through them. Some of their accomplishments involve the following: training of Christians on how to share the gospel with non-believers; showing the Jesus film to nearly 2,000 people; leading 930 people to Jesus as their personal Savior; planting a new church at a Christian college among others. . . Please pray especially to those who gave their lives to Jesus as they continue being disciplined. Thank you so much beloved for your role in our lives and ministry. Pray also for our monthly support which is quite low, as well as the remaining funds towards replacement of our car (\$4,000-5,000). God bless you.

We prepared to serve 120 and we came close with 115 (plus another 20 persons who helped prepare and serve the meal). There were many comments of appreciation for the menu served (baked chicken and baked potato with roll, green beans and ...thanks to Shirley Krall... a wonderful Whoopie Pie for dessert. And, there were many comments of appreciation for this ministry of Myerstown UCC by way of a meal that allows friends and neighbors to sit down together and share in a time of eating and conversation. Our meal next month, April, will be mini meatloaves, scalloped potatoes, cole slaw, rolls and Apple Pie.

Speaking of Whoopie Pies, there was an article in the Lancaster news about where to get the best whoopee pies and some of the strange ones were Key Lime Whoopie Pies, Cornbread with Crab! Well, Shirley made for us, what is really the best...just plain soft chocolate with cream icing. Many asked for her recipe following the meal. She made 120 and we had one left over. We don't know who didn't get one, but there were a few that split theirs with a neighbor.

Here's the recipe:

Makes 15 (thirty scoops) assembled

Cream together: 2 cups sugar/1 cup Crisco/ 2 eggs/2 teaspoons vanilla/1 cup sour cream;

Combine and add to creamed mix: 4 cups flour/1 cup of cocoa powder/2 teaspoons salt;

Stir together: 2 teaspoons baking soda/1 cup hot water...add to above mixture;

Drop by Tablespoons onto greased cookie sheets. Bake at 350 degrees until they spring back when pressed lightly with fork (approximately 14 minutes baking time). Cool and fill with icing mix of your choice....For the Thursday meal we used icing/filling from Sunnyside Pastry in Lancaster County.

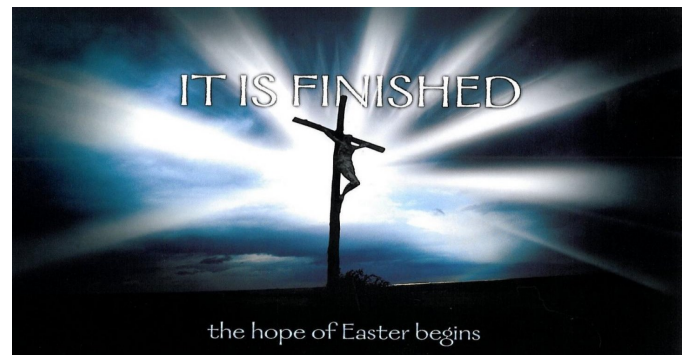

HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE MARCH COUNCIL MEETING:

After being called to order by President Kory Leppo, the Council began with Devotions and Approval of the Minutes. The Treasurer's report was not available again this month, but will be voted on next month. Thanksgivings and concerns were presented. The steps to seek a new pastor were discussed. Council also discussed presenting a motion to the congregation to reduce the number of search committee members based on our current number of regular members. A "Media Permission for Minors" document was edited and approved by Council. Mark Herr can begin getting signatures from all of the parents of our children/minors to be displayed on social media. Committee and Task Group reports were presented. Highlights included approving the newly created Parish Administrator job description and approving Emily Frantz for the position. Other items of discussion were the locking and unlocking of the church, community meal preparation, and the work of the Congregational Assessment Team, the By-laws revision team, and the Nominating team. Old Business included the by-laws, the treasurer vacancy, the inclement weather policy, the Muthengi ministry, church insurance, and retaining a lawyer. New business discussed was participation in One Great Hour of Sharing, the importance of coffee hour and gathering time, and Holy Week services. Due to low numbers of youth, musicians, and changes in job a motion was made to suspend the Easter Vigil service this year, hoping to gain have the service next year. The meeting closed in prayer and was adjourned.

APRIL 22 IS EARTH DAY

Earth Day is an annual event created to celebrate the planet's environment and raise public awareness about pollution. The day, marked on April 22, is observed worldwide with rallies, conferences, outdoor activities and service projects.



Started as a grassroots movement, Earth Day created public support for the creation of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and contributed to the passage of the Clean Air Act, the Water Quality Improvement Act, the Endangered Species Act and several other environmental laws. The idea for Earth Day was proposed by then-Sen. Gaylord Nelson of Wisconsin, who died in 2005.
