from the Pastor ... GIANT RUMMAGE SALES

"The only way to understand what is happening to us as twenty-first-century Christians in North America is first to understand that about every 500 years the Church feels compelled to hold a giant rummage sale. ...we are [now] living in and through one of those 500-year sales." (Anglican Bishop Mark Dyer, quoted in Phyllis Tickle, <u>The Great Emergence</u>; Baker 2008, p. 16).

By 500 A.D., Christianity had become a creedal institution. The "Great Schism" of 1054 A.D. split the Church into Orthodox and Catholic. In 1517, Martin Luther nailed his "95 Theses" on a German church door, sparking the Reformation. 500 years after Luther, the Church in the West is experiencing seismic shifts in global culture, politics, and spirituality. Our new normal is here!

We now live in a cauldron of contention at every level. Public meetings involve shouting and threats, even fights. State and national capitols are targets of rage. Government service is now dangerous for public servants and their families, even for ballot counters. Religious denominations struggle with conflict at every level, even globally. Civil societies cannot survive like this

Local churches struggle and fail. Pews have emptied out for years. Younger generations have left. Few folks look to the church as their social center, or seek baptisms, confirmations, weddings, and funerals. Few young adults choose ministry as a profession: high stress, low pay, poor mobility. Clergy attrition increases as candidates decrease. Parttime is now the norm.

Add to this the clergy abuse plague and the unconscionably poor response to such abuse by church leaders. Too many churches have been subsumed by culture wars and political manipulation, while others remain timid and tepid in the face of injustice and suffering. Is it any wonder that so many people, especially young people, have given up on us? Not at all!

Yes, some evangelical churches grow, but mostly from people circulating from one church to another. Megachurches come and go. Their longevity over time is suspect at best, especially when their superstar pastors transgress or retire. Add to all of this the toxic mingling of White Christian nationalism with evangelical Christianity, and we have a lot to discourage us!

This is a very long way of saying that I come to you with a broken heart, having witnessed 50 years of unrelenting church decline; with my eyes wide open, given the plethora of present-day challenges; and with humility, knowing that I am your seventh pastor in seven years. You've been through a lot and are a fraction of what you once were as a congregation.

I get all of this. I can't fix it. I do not have all the answers. I cannot save your church, or any other for that matter. What I <u>can</u> do is be open and honest, humble and faithful, inquisitive and resourceful, courageous and compassionate, in Christ's name. We can survey our changing cultural landscape together, chart a course forward as partners in ministry, and pray...a lot!

Will you join heart and hand with me on this journey? I hope so! Let's see where the Spirit leads us, and may God guide our every step.

Mission Updates Julius Muthegi

Our special missions offering for the month of June is to help support Julius Muthengi and the villagers in Kalima Kathei, Kenya, in their quest for clean drinking water, through a well which was dug in 2016. Our church donated money to help dig the well. Before the well, the villagers had to use an unsanitary watering hole on private land that was used by both humans and animals. During the dry season, the hole would dry up and people had to pay for water.
