## *Pastor's Thoughts . . .*

Recently, eight youth completed the process of confirmation and are now full members of our congregation. I suggested on that day, and now repeat, that it is incumbent upon all members to regard these young persons as full members and to continue to teach them. The most important teaching tool is one that every member possesses and has complete control over. That is, our example. How we conduct ourselves in worship, in meetings, at activities and in our every interaction will continually provide these new members a model for how congregations function. So, this article is a call to consider fully, just how positive an example are each of us setting for them?

No one can predict just how active any new member will choose to become. But we can project a likely outcome based on how we choose to demonstrate our understanding and commitment to our faith. Many times, persons fall away because they frankly see no difference between how members of a church behave and those persons who have no church affiliation. I have heard any number of young adult's state, "Why should I participate in a church when I do not see it making a difference in how people behave."

Yes, this is sometimes an excuse. But it is an excuse that many of us all too easily provide. It has been stated that there are no politics like church politics. Too many times this is sadly true. The church is to be a shining example of how society could be, not merely a glossy reflection of how culture currently presents itself. Rather than being nonpolitical, in too many instances church is used to underscore political bias and opinion. Instead of building up one another, many examples of harsh criticism, gossip and slander dominate interactions. And, instead of learning to grow in spirit and grace, the harboring of grudges and resentments breed unhealthy competition. Finally, in place of fostering a healthy respect for one another, personal boundaries are frequently trampled.

Jesus taught and we are to choose to learn to follow his exhortations to love one another. Not conditionally, not when it is expedient, but always and in all things. Is this difficult? You bet it is. But, with God's grace and not our personal sense of entitlement, such is not only possible, it is achievable.

Will we do it perfectly? No. But, when we fall short, we can confess and not offer excuses. We can strive to make amends and we can accept apologies graciously. Most importantly, we do not need to know everything about everybody. As the Apostle's would learn, after much trial and error, 'in God's own time, all things will be revealed, whether in this life or the next.'

So, please think about these things as we go forth with our newest members. Let us provide positive reasons to be more involved and not excuses for staying away.

We praise God for the privilege of being his children as well as his servants. His ministry at the university is progressing well. We have just finished our January to April semester, and we are now focused on modules and short courses. It is also a busy time for us as we are preparing students for graduation scheduled for June 21st. Pray for the graduates as they finalize their research projects and theses. As you are aware, Agnes and I are also committed to ministry among our people in the village. Many of these people lack basic things in life such as food, electricity, ability to educate their children among other needs. We thank God for those of you who have not only prayed for this ministry, but also given gifts to help meet some of the needs mentioned above. That notwithstanding, we are deeply grateful from the bottom of our hearts to those who support us regularly! Such support makes it possible for us to serve God effectively here in Kenya.

As you pray for us, please ask God to provide the funds we need in order to replace our old vehicle. We thank God one of our supporting Church and one couple who sent us \$8,100 in September 2018. We still need additional \$5,000-6,000 in order to purchase another used vehicle. Prices of vehicles here in Kenya keep going up every few months! Thank you so much friends for being there for us. # Community Meal

Our 2018-2019 Community Meal has finished out another year!

Thanks is extended to the more than 20 persons who, throughout the six Community Meals held at our church this year, helped in so many ways. Here are just a few of the many little, but extremely important jobs:

Purchasing and ordering sufficient food for the dinner; Preparation for the meal (mornings of the meal)...mixing, cooking, running out to purchase missing or short supply items, getting things ready to be heated later; Dining area set up and clean up; Coming back in the early afternoon to see that the food is placed in the ovens, warmers, etc.; Serving the food; Bringing the food to the folks at the tables; Welcoming the diners; Making the desserts and serving them at the meal; Clean up and Washing of the dishes/pots/pans/utensils and more!

Each month that we held the meal (October, November, December, March, April, and May) we served approximately 110 persons. The offerings for the meals were most generous. The regular attendees and the "newbies" expressed appreciation for the meal.

This ministry of food and fellowship that we offer to the community is just one of many such ministries throughout our region (and our country). Churches across the land have learned that ministry and sharing the faith by eating together is important in our needy towns and neighborhoods...for physical, social and spiritual nourishment. I have noticed that as many churches have ceased having covered dish meals with their members, these community meals have often replaced them.

A 20<sup>th</sup> century American philosopher has penned something that I think is appropriate as we reflect on what so many of us have had a part in doing this past year through our Community Meals. Ernest Holmes has written *"Pure religion manifests itself through acts of kindness and mercy...It unifies with all humanity and finds no great difference between saint and sinner Such a religion as this, the world of today needs, for it is sick of pretense and would like a practical demonstration of a belief in God, made manifest through good works."*

### Highlights from the May council meeting:

The meeting was held on Tuesday, May 7 at 6:30 pm. Minutes and treasurer reports were reviewed and approved. Thanksgivings and concerns about members were expressed. Staff reports followed including the letter from Pastor Luciotti regarding his intent not to renew his current contract as interim. His final day will be [July 31, 2019](#). The resignation of Secretary Lee Ann Kurash was also announced as follow-up to an email that had been sent. Committee reports were next. Action taken was taken to approve the Compensation and Personnel Matters for Salaried Employees, the Compensation and Personnel Matters for Non -Salaried Employees, and the Performance Review document and a Vacation/Leave Request Form as requested by personnel. The Secretary job description was approved and three other job descriptions were handed out to be reviewed at the next meeting. The personnel committee also recommended the hiring of Katie Fields to be the temporary secretary. Salaries were discussed and set. Office hours will be [Monday – Friday, 9 am – noon](#) and the secretary will work [8 am – noon](#). Personnel committee is in need of additional members. Property Committee continues to address the needs of our old building and property. Elders and Care Team are working with Emily and Pastor to update our members in care list and to develop an organized tracking system. Mark Herr will head up the Worship support team effective immediately, along with input from Pastor Rick.

There is continued need for a Treasurer to fill the vacancy. A group needs to be created to address this issue. We also need to solidify church legal council. Potential search committee members were discussed. The church profile will be reviewed at a special council meeting prior to the next regularly scheduled meeting. Membership group created a membership list update handed out by Sue Harvey. Council members were asked to review the list and bring input to the next meeting. Reminder that the summer schedule [begins on May 26<sup>th</sup>](#) with one service [at 9:00 am](#). Council will meet on Sunday, May 19<sup>th</sup> at 11:00 a.m. Meeting concluded with prayer and was adjourned.

Church council held a brief meeting on Sunday, May 19th after the worship service. At this meeting, council approved job descriptions for Worship Music Coordinator/Organist, Choir Director and Financial Administrator. Also approved was the draft of the church profile, and the first five members of the search committee: Doug Bohannon, Chair, Travis Bicher, Donald Brown, Susan Harvey, and Wanda Rabold. A congregational meeting will be held after the [June 9th](#) worship service to discuss the profile. The profile is available electronically by contacting the church office. Hard copies are available (one per family please) at the church office and on the Information Counter in the Gathering Area of the church.

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
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## Worship Support Team Update
