from the Pastor.. "Who's (or, What's) Our Competition?

"We have a lot of competition!" a faithful member told me. "There are a lot of churches around here!" How many churches are there? <u>Look at these numbers!</u> There are <u>150</u> churches within a 7-mile radius of our church; <u>70</u> within a 5-mile radius; and <u>40</u> churches within a 3-mile radius. That's <u>a lot</u> of churches!!

They represent everything from Anabaptist to Catholic to Evangelical to Pentecostal to "Mainline Protestant" (e.g., Episcopal, Lutheran, Methodist, UCC). Why so many? Because they started in horse and buggy days, a short distance from the people they served. With automobiles and improved roads, plus farm to factory migration, city and town churches grew while many country churches stagnated.

As Northeast/Midwest industries thrived, "brand name" corporate-like denominations predominated, producing Presidents, industrialists, and cultural elites from the 1860s to the 1960s, such as John D. Rockefeller, Jr., who funded the Interchurch Center in New York City, the ultimate symbol of mainline Protestant power. As factories closed and communities changed, these Northeast/Midwest-oriented denominations lost members and churches for 40 years. We are now the faithful remnant.

Though some churches in our area represent sects (e.g., Mennonites), and others are more recent start-ups, many hang on as small "kith and kin" churches, like extended families with part-time pastors. Once mainstays in towns and cities, "tall steeple" churches like ours, with full-time seminary-trained pastors and staff, declined when industries closed, jobs left, and young people moved away. Now, we have too many churches with too few people, and downsized, underfunded denominational support systems.

Also, yours is not the only church to brood in the shadows of a megachurch. Yes, they're intimidating. Yes, they're growing. Yes, they have programs. Yet, I rarely encounter a church like yours that asks the right questions about them. I hear criticism more than curiosity. Let me ask you this: Which is worse, a megachurch where it's easy to be "entertained" and remain anonymous, or an emptied-out church that "needs members" to pay bills and fill committee "slots"? *Please be honest!*

The scores of "kith and kin" churches around us <u>are not</u> our competition. Neither are the "plain people" congregations (e.g., Mennonites) or the small start-ups forming to serve specific groups, such as immigrants. Our UCC sibling churches and cousins in other mainline Protestant denominations <u>are not</u> our competition; they are our partners in mission and ministry! Could collaborative ministry be our future?

<u>The competition is our changing culture</u>. When your church peaked after WWII, church attendance was at an all-time high in U.S. history. Most Americans claimed a church affiliation. Most women with children were at home. Three-day holiday weekends didn't exist and our culture supported Sunday closures and religious activities. That has changed and we're not going back.... *ever*. It's time to move on.

Megachurches notwithstanding, U.S. church participation has fallen for decades. My hunch is that megachurches "circulate the saints" from other churches to theirs, perhaps claiming some inactive folks along the way. (I need more data to support my claim!) Our local megachurch, "LCBC" (Lancaster County Bible Church d.b.a. "Lives Changed By Christ"), averages <u>19,000</u> per weekend in 19 locations, after humble beginnings. Could we learn something from them? They also <u>are not</u> our competition.

When our culture's competition is so great, and our hope falters, we are tempted to give in and give up. When the prophet Elijah lost all hope he walked into the wilderness, sat down under a broom tree, and prayed for death (1 Kings 19:4). But God still had plans for Elijah; namely, to anoint his prophetic successor and also two kings. Likewise, God is not done with us yet! So, rest and renew yourselves for a bit in the shade; then, get up and get going! The time has come!

Dear Friends at Myerstown UCC, (rec'd 8/20/22)



Special Outreach for September

During September our special mission offering will be Neighbors in Need (NIN), a program of the United Church of Christ that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry. Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Neighbors in Need grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. These grants fund projects whose work ranges from direct service to community organizing and advocacy to address systemic injustice. This year, special consideration will be given to projects focusing on serving our immigrant neighbors and communities. Many UCC congregations will receive the NIN

offering on October 2, 2022 as part of their World Communion Sunday observance but we will accept contributions throughout September.


