from the Pastor...

"Were You There?"

Were you there when they crucified my Lord?
Were you there when they crucified my Lord?
Oh, sometimes it causes me to tremble, tremble, tremble.
Were you there when they crucified my Lord?

Some songs leave us speechless. This one leaves me speechless every time. Words cannot capture its soul-deep, bone-stirring sentiment. Words cannot adequately express the overwhelming events and experiences it describes. When we experience such agony and grief, such stunning shock and surprise, words often fail us.

An African American spiritual that probably predates the Civil War, "Were You There?" was first published in 1899. Similar to Bluegrass music's early fusions of "hillbilly," gospel, and blues music, this spiritual's earlier roots include a white spiritual known in Tennessee as "Have you heard how they crucified my Lord?"

All four verses of "Were You There?" invite us to identify with the witnesses of Christ's death and resurrection. Across the vast distance of geography and time, we become part of the countless millions who have contemplated the meaning of the cross of Christ.

One phrase from the second verse stands out: "Were you there when they nailed him to the tree?" For African-Americans before and after the Civil War, "the cross and the lynching tree" have special meaning. Though both were symbols of horrific death, one represents transformational hope and the other intractable racial hatred.

Few people "apart from black poets, novelists, and other reality-seeking artists, have explored the symbolic connections." (James Cone, *The Cross and the Lynching Tree*, xiii). The symbolic connection was certainly not lost on the first African-Americans to sing it.

The lyrics of this beloved spiritual transport us from the grotesque horrors of Good Friday afternoon to the stunning mystery of Easter Dawn. We are transported from darkness to light, from despair to hope, from defeat to victory. In this Lenten season, as always, we stand suspended between the two, in speechless silence.

Take time to drink in, breathe in, and absorb deeply this profound expression of sorrow, coming from the heartache and backache of those enslaved and beaten down, singing about Jesus' suffering as they suffered, about Jesus' hanging as they were hung. Just as we remember Jesus' redemptive suffering, we remember theirs as well.

Even more, take time to marvel at the heartfelt hope and determination of those who believed that better days were coming; that their children, or grandchildren, or even distant generations, would one day stand tall and proud, free and equal, among all of God's children. For now, just sing this song. Then, speak it. Then, be silent.

Prayer: Silence us, O God, at the foot of the cross. Though words may fail us, amazement and wonder never fail to speak to our souls. May it be so, in Jesus' name. Amen.

"VISION TEAM" UPDATE

Approved by our Annual Meeting (11/20/22), the "Vision Team" started after the holiday season. The team read an 88-page resource on churches facing difficult decisions re: their future (*Living Legacy*, published by the national United Church of Christ). At their first meeting (2/1), Rev. Greer distributed more readings to be discussed at their second meeting (2/15).

Starting 3/1, the Team will interview "experts" on various topics from property management to real estate, to church decline and partnerships/mergers. The Team's goal is to identify the most viable options for our future: from closing/disbanding, to continuing "as is," to every thing in between, all pros and cons considered. Informal conversations with other church es are starting.

Until the Team has more definitive information, they can't answer specific questions. Be patient! It's simply a matter of not having enough information to speak factually.
